1 KINGS 17—2 KINGS 2

What was a prophet?

One specially called by God to speak for Him

May have had just one message (e.g. Jonah) or a lifetime of messages (e.g. Jeremiah)

One of great faith and courage

What was a prophet's role in Israel and Judah?

To expose the sin(s) of the king or the people

To remind the king of God's covenant promises

To be the godly "conscience" of the state

They were God's mouthpieces

They were God's ambassadors

Ultimately, they were God's servants

To go where He sent them

To say what He told them

LESSON THEME: 5 characteristics of God's servants

God's Servants ...

Have first been trained by Him in private (17) Like Elijah

To depend on God's provision

To wait on God's timing (Lk 4:25-27)

To pray for God's will (Jas 5:17)

To learn contentment in all circumstances

To learn that the obedient servant can count on the Lord's faithful provision

To learn suffering

How does this apply to us?

Are you available, or "off limits" to God?

Are you serving and waiting faithfully in your current "behind the scenes" assignment?

Have you learned to be patient and content?

Have you grown in your practice of prayer?

Have you learned to trust in spite of suffering?

Fearlessly minister in public (18)

Like Elijah

Unashamed to be known as God's man

Stands tall with God amidst the ungodly

Calls on the ungodly to repent

Trusts God for the impossible

Doesn't tolerate evil

Prays

How does this apply to us?

Are you unashamed to be known as God's?

Do you stand tall with God amidst the ungodly?

Do you speak to the ungodly about God?

Do others see you trust God for the impossible?

Do you tolerate evil?

Must guard against discouragement (19)

Like Elijah

Great despair and discouragement often follow great victory

Despair and discouragement often come to the "Lone Ranger"

Despair and discouragement are often caused by pride, ignorance or unmet expectations

Despair and discouragement abate by spending time with God How does this apply to us?

Are you discouraged in your service?

Are you serving as a "Lone Ranger?"

Do you allow pride, ignorance or unmet expectations to make you discouraged?

Are you spending adequate time alone with God?

Faithfully speak His Word in every situation (1 Kings 20—2 Kings 1)

Like an unnamed prophet, Elijah and Micaiah

Offer messages of hope

Wait for a response of repentance

Deliver messages of judgment

Speak in the confidence that God's authority can be resisted but never overcome

How does this apply to us?

Do you offer messages of hope to others?

Do you wait for a response before offering more counsel?

Do you back away from sharing messages of warning or judgment?

Give their lives away in His service (2 Kings 2)

Like Elijah

Elijah gave his life away in God's service

Elisha gave his life away to God's service (1 Kin 19; 2 Kin 2)


How does this apply to us?


1 & 2 KINGS IN CONTRAST

1 Kings

Begins with King David
Opens with Solomon's glory
Begins with the blessings of obedience
Opens with the building of the Temple
Traces the progress of apostasy
Shows how kings failed to rule God's people
Introduces the prophet Elijah
Emphasizes the patience of the Lord

2 Kings

Ends with the king of Babylon
Closes with Jehoiachin's shame
Ends with the curse of disobedience
Closes with the burning of the Temple
Describes the consequences of apostasy
Depicts the consequences of that failure
Introduces the prophet Elisha
Confirms the Lord's sure punishment of sin







Similar Ministries Elijah Elisha Pronounces a drought 1 Kings 17:1,7 Natural disaster Prophesies a famine 2 Kings 8:1 Is fed by ravens and an angel 1 Kings 17:6; 19:3-8 Miraculous food and water Miraculously feeds others 2 Kings 2:19-22; 4:38-44 Provides flour and oil for widow and her son 1 Kings 17:7–16 Care for a widow Fills widow's jar with oil 2 Kings 4:1-7 Prays and stretches himself on widow's dead son three times; boy's life returns 1 Kings 17:17-24 Raising of the dead Prays and stretches himself on Shunammite's dead son two times; boy's life returns 2 Kings 4:32-37 Slaughters prophets of Baal 1 Kings 18:40 Execution of God's judgment Calls down curse on unruly youths; 42 are mauled by bears 2 Kings 2:23-25 Prays for rain and rain comes 1 Kings 18:41-45 Prophecy for rain Prophesies that water will fill ditches in the land; water flows from the land of Edom 2 Kings 3:14-20 Prophesies the death of Jezebel 1 Kings 21:23; 2 Kings 9:30-37 Prediction of monarch's death Prophesies the murder of a king 2 Kings 8:10-15 Divides Jordan with cloak and walks through on dry ground 2 Kings 2:7-8 Passage through the Jordan Strikes Jordan with cloak; it divides, and he crosses over on dry ground 2 Kings 2:13-14 Goes to heaven in a whirlwind; a chariot and horses of fire appear 2 Kings 2:11 Mysterious end of life Dies and is buried; a dead man's body comes to life after touching his bones 2 Kings 13:20-21 The NIV Quickview Bible - www.thequickviewbible.com
