A.N.E.: When a mighty warrior-king could consummate an epic battle in a single day


O.T.: A "day" of *tribulation* for Israel/Judah

Discipline/suffering for repentance/purification

O.T.: A "day" of *triumph* for Israel/Judah Gentile oppressors will be judged for their sins

O.T.: A "day" of *reversal of fortunes*Gentile nations will be "put down"
God will bountifully restore what He "took"

A REVERSAL OF FORTUNES

A Present Crisis (1:1-20)

A present "day" of tribulation for Judah God has sent drought and locusts as His discipline ▷ He's seeking to gain His people's repentance

A "day" of triumph

The locust "army" can be driven back Agricultural fertility can be restored

A reversal of fortunes

At the Lord's direction, barrenness will be turned into fruitfulness ... with your repentance

A Coming Conflict (2:1-27)

A soon-coming "day" of tribulation for Judah
A "locust-like" army will be God's discipline
The Assyrian "locusts" will invade and devour
Heart-level repentance and trust is required
A "day" of triumph

The Final Day (2:28-3:21)

The promise at the "dawn" of the final "Day"

Hebrews 1:2; Acts 2:14-21


To paraphrase Peter: As surely as the things Joel predicted have come true (so far), so does this event announce the final "Day"

Meaning there will be tribulation ahead for Israel

Meaning eventually there will be triumph for Israel

Meaning one day Israel's fortunes will be reversed

Peter's Use of Joel



The Final Day of the Lord

An eschatological "day" of tribulation

Gentile oppression will be God's discipline

Gentile armies of the world will gather against her

Heart-level repentance and trust will be required

A "day" of triumph

The Lord Himself will return, gather and lead His army in triumph over these Gentile nations

The Lord will judge the Gentile nations with respect to their sins against Israel

A reversal of fortunes (3:17-21)

Israel will live in the holy city of Jerusalem

Their barren land will be restored to fruitfulness

They will be a purified people

They will live in peace under the rule of their glorious King

But in 835 B.C. ...

Judah's heart has grown colder and wandered

She's satisfied with just "getting by" in her relationship with her Lord

She's been negligent toward His Word

Maybe she has the "when/then" isorder

Maybe it's just living in sin or spiritual adultery

The Lord has sent locusts ...

They need to repent ... TODAY!

APPLICATION: God won't allow His children to sin successfully

How He Treats His Wandering Child

A "day" of tribulation

Have locusts been eating your life's "crops?"

Have you become complacent, lazy or satisfied with just "getting by" in your relationship with the Lord?

Do you have the "when/then" disorder?

Have you been negligent or spiritually adulterous?

Are you just in outright sin?

Have you even noticed the barrenness yet?

When you look in the rearview mirror of your life are there patches of "waste" back there? Wasted days, months ... or even years?

You need to know that God has sent or allowed those "locusts" into your life to "eat up" and "devour" He's done it—as He did to Judah—to get your attention, and to get you to turn to Him in repentance and trust

How He Treats the Repentant

Heart-level repentance

2 Cor 7:9-11

A "day" of triumph awaits

It's never too late!

He will drive the "locusts" back

His refreshing "rain" will fall again on your soul

He will cause new, bountiful life to spring up where before there was only barrenness

A reversal of fortunes awaits...

"You cannot have back your time, but there is a strange and wonderful way in which God can give back to you the wasted blessings, the unripened fruits of years over which you mourned ... It is a pity that they should have been locust-eaten by your folly and negligence; but if they have been so, be not hopeless concerning them."

The Identification of the Locusts in Joel 1:4

The four types of locusts identified by Joel are apparently four successive stages in the development of the swarming desert locust. Joel 1:4 records the order in which the locusts appeared in the land, while 2:25 presents the logical order in which the locust develops (starting with the adult and then showing the development of their offspring). The order found in Joel 1:4 is as follows:

"Locust swarm" (NIV)/"Gnawing locust" (NASB) = young locusts

"Great locusts" (NIV)/"Swarming locust" (NASB) = mature locusts

"Young locusts" (NIV)/"Creeping locust" (NASB) = newly hatched locusts

"Other locusts" (NIV)/"Stripping locust" (NASB) = younger locusts

"Joel wrote to warn his audience about a coming day in which God would judge His people. He compared this devastating judgment to a terrible locust invasion that had fairly recently swept through the land. What he said about this coming judgment has only seen partial fulfillment; some of it still lies in the eschatological future (i.e., the eschaton or end times for planet earth). God would send blessing as well as judgment, however, and this too has only come partially on the Israelites so far. The prophet warned his hearers that unless they repented of their empty formalism in worship, and turned back to Yahweh wholeheartedly, devastating judgment would overtake them. If they repented, God would pardon them and restore His blessings to them abundantly."

The Day of the LORD (2:1-32)

Joel 1:15; 3:14-16 Isa 13:6-13 Jer 46:10 Ezek 30:1-5 Amos 5:18-20 Zeph 1:14-18; 2:1-3 Zech 14:1-21 Mal 4:5-6 Acts 2:17-21 1 Thes 5:1-4 2 Pet 3:3-14 The day of the Lord is a central concept in the book of Joel. The term *day of the Lord* first appeared in the prophecy of Amos (Amos 5:18), but it did not originate with him. Amos was correcting a popular misunderstanding that the Israelites already held. They believed that the day of the Lord would be a joyous day of salvation when God would intervene in the world to judge Israel's enemies and reestablish Israelite rule over all of greater Canaan. Amos warned them that the day of the Lord would not be light for them, but darkness, for they were in rebellion against the Lord (e.g., Amos 5:10-12, 21-27). Self-confident Israelites assumed that God was always on their side, but their sins had, in fact, made them God's enemies, and they deserved his full punishment. A little over a century after Amos, Zephaniah said very similar things to the Judeans about the day of the Lord (e.g., Zeph 1:7-18). The theme became part of the standard vocabulary of the prophets, often being referred to simply as "that day" (Isa 2:11; 27:1; Jer 31:1; Hos 2:18; Mic 7:11; Zech 3:10).

Joel interpreted the locust plague much as Amos or Zephaniah would have done (see 1:7-9, 14-18). Joel saw the plague as a sign that the day of the Lord was near, and that God was judging the people of Judah and Jerusalem for their sins. Their only proper response was to gather in the Temple and repent. In the second half of the book, however, Joel foretold a day of the Lord yet to come. At that time, God would pour out his Spirit on Israel (2:28-32); he would restore his repentant people, vindicate them, and punish the nations that had oppressed them. In this way, Joel combines both understandings of the day of the Lord. It is a day of judgment for all who rebel against God, including sinful Israelites. But it is also a day of salvation for those who have listened to the words of the prophets and have turned to the Lord.
