THE TIMES ...

Nahum was sent to Nineveh to announce her impending judgment (occurred in 612 BC)

Hezekiah's son and grandson, Manasseh and Amon, have just finished their wicked 57-year rule (see 2 Kings 21) ...

They've willingly been Assyria's loyal vassal

They've adopted Assyria's ways and worship

They've hung "Damocles' Sword" over Judah

Now "Josiah the Reformer" has come to Judah's throne implementing sweeping spiritual changes in accordance with the newly rediscovered Word of God (see 2 Kings 22–23)

But while Josiah's reforms are changing the outward appearance of the kingdom, they're not penetrating deep nto the people's hearts

Judah's repentance is only "skin deep"

So Zephaniah is sent to warn and to beg

ZAPHANIAH SUMMARIZED IN A WORD OR PHRASE: "The Day"

THE BASICS ...

Who: Zephaniah ("The Lord hides") When: pre-exilic (640-621 BC) Where: primarily to Judah and Jerusalem Why: "Zephaniah's purpose was to announce coming judgment on Judah in the Day of the Lord. However, he said that judgment would extend to all the nations of the earth, indicating that the Day of the Lord would also bring deliverance for Israel and the Gentiles." –Dr. Charles Dyer

LESSON THEME: Repentance is known by new obedience

A Coming Day of Judgment (1:2–3:8)

Against the whole world (1:2-3)

Notice the Noahic flood language (see Gen 6)

It will begin with God's people (1:4-2:3)

Special revelation: responsibility and judgment

Judah is judged for her syncretism

She's judged for her heartless religiosity

But repent now ... and perhaps God will even yet be merciful!

It will spread to the Gentile nations (2:4-15)

West: Philistia; East: Moab and Ammon

South: Egypt/Ethiopia; North: Assyria

For your oppression borne of arrogance

For an indifferent, complacent, carefree attitude

For your prideful self-sufficiency

Even consuming Jerusalem (3:1-8)

For harboring oppressors who disregard rights

For harboring *rebels* who refuse to submit

For harboring defilers who're polluted by sinful influences and practices

The holy city is unholy ... and God has had enough

Lessons for Judah

As the Holy One, God will judge sin; "God will not let His children sin successfully."

Illustration: the monkey trap ⊳

When the sinner won't offer himself to God as a living sacrifice (Rom 12),

he'll become the sacrifice for and victim of his own sin

A Coming Day of Joy (3:9-20)

But God isn't leading them to Babylon to leave them in Babylon ...

They will return (3:9-10)

Israel will turn to Him; He will come for them

The remnant will return to the Promised Land

They will be restored (3:11-13)

Their fortunes will be reversed

They will rejoice! (3:14-20)

Lessons for Judah


God will not always be angry with you

He will turn toward you again, healing and restoring you (see Numbers 23:19-20)

His chastening is only for a little while, for your purification and holiness

One day, the whole earth will recognize and worship God for how He's dealt with you

One day, God says, My people will be a blessing to the entire world



A monkey trap

APPLICATION 1: Repentance is known by new obedience

"Superficial" Repentance

Loves remorse and religiosity

Is looking for a quick fix or a shortcut so it can just "get on with it"

Has an attitude of "this change is enough" rather than "do whatever it takes, Lord"

Believes God is pleased and/or fooled by wearing this "mask" of superficiality

Desires "to appear" more than "to be"

Such ones are the "monkeys" with their hand caught in the gourd

Such ones are too attached to the world and its ways to trust and surrender more

Such ones keep up appearances and pretend; but their hearts are growing harder every day

In reality such ones are defiant, indifferent, callous and complacent towards holiness

Bottom Line

Pretenders will be exposed and disciplined

When the sinner won't offer himself to God as a living sacrifice (Rom 12:1-2), he'll instead become the *sacrifice* for and *victim* of his own sin (Rom 6:23)

BUT ... those who repent will be shown mercy and restored by the Lord (1 John 1:9 - Peter)

Believer: Remember the pile ...

Questions

Is your heart cold, lukewarm or hot toward the Lord, His Word and His worship today?

Do you have a "Sunday only" relationship?

Where have you grown weary of walking with the Lord and obeying Him?

Does your lifestyle (speech, actions, attitudes) magnify the Lord or does it instead disgrace His name in front of others?

APPLICATION 2: The faithful worship while they wait on God

Worship While We Wait

Focus on God's timeless character over our present-day suffering

Worship Him for Who He is ...

He's an all-powerful Savior

He'll always be with you and never forsake you

He's compassionate and merciful to the humble

He's the protector of the weak and of those who wait and depend on Him He is faithful and just

Pray the Psalms; sing hymns or spiritual songs to yourself (see Eph 5:18-20)

Have hope ... because God is faithful to do what He says He'll do—one day He'll turn your day of suffering into a day of joy

Continue to walk in the light with Him while you're waiting

Wait on Him to do His good work

Encourage one another in these truths because ...

Every believer is fighting some battle every day that you know nothing about!

We need to worship together, encourage one another and wait patiently together (for instance, in a Home Group)

Zephaniah Would Remind Us ...


True repentance can be recognized by a new obedience in the opposite direction The faithful worship while they wait on God

Zephaniah announced God's judgment against both JUDAH and its long-time foes all around, including PHILISTIA, MOAB, and AMMON.

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


