I. The **SIN OFFERING** expressed _____ for personal sin.

"... If anyone sins unintentionally in any of the Lord's commandments about things not to be done, and does any one of them, if it is the anointed priest who sins, thus bringing guilt on the people, then he shall offer for the sin that he has committed a bull from the herd without blemish to the Lord for a sin offering ..." Leviticus 4

Tabernacle Devotional Walk

God used two chapters to record the creation of the universe, but He fifty chapters to describe the construction of the Tabernacle—it seems that the Tabernacle was very important to Him. We are now His Tabernacle, and the dwelling place of God is in our hearts. Read Psalm 139:23-34 to you prepare, and picture yourself at the Tabernacle as you utilize these prayer prompts.

1. Begin your journey at the Gate.

Read Psalm 100:4, 27:4-6, 64:4, 84:10 and John 10:9.

The outer court in the tabernacle was a crowded, busy place that can represent how I live. My outer courtyard can be the noise that inhibits me from focusing on Him. In the outer courts of praise my heart is prepared to go into the Holy Place. I take a moment and let the breath of God fill my lungs as I thank Him for who He is.

2. Stop at the Altar of Sacrifice.

Read Hebrews 10:12; 2 Corinthians 5:21 and Romans 12:1.

I bring with me a burden God never asked me to carry. I cannot fully experience unity with His Spirit when the cares of the world act as barriers to intimacy with my Lord. I recognize where I need to place my trust and I surrender my burden, asking God to secure it to the altar and to help me not pick it up again. Jesus' once-for-all offering of Himself as my sin substitute has not only made me acceptable to God but also provides for my eternal safe-keeping. I rest in His righteousness alone.

3. Confront your reflection in the Bronze Basin.

Read Psalm 66:18; 1 John 1:9 and 2 Corinthians 5:17.

Jesus offers to wash away my sins, struggles, everything that is hindering me from feeling clean. This basin is filled with liquid grace. Will I let His grace and living waters wash me now? As I gaze into the water in the basin, whose reflection do I see? Do I see Jesus with the new me, or the accuser with my old self?

4. Enter the dark room of the Holy Place, where the beautiful Golden Lampstand fills the room with its glow.

Read John 8:12 and Matthew 5:14.

What is being shown to me through the light of Jesus' love and affection for me? His love in me should shine into a dark and dying world through my words and my walk.

5. Turning behind you, stop at the Table of Showbread.

Read John 6:35 and Matthew 4:4.

When I sit at the table to feast on God's Word, not only am I spiritually nourished but my eyes are opened, and I recognize Him at work in my life. God's Word should be in my heart and on my lips as I go about my day.

6. Take a few steps to the left and watch the smoke rising from the Altar of Incense.

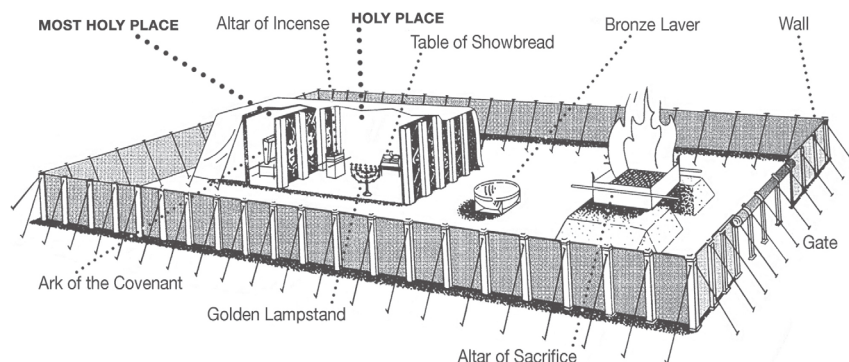
Read Hebrews 7:25 and 1 John 5:14.

Am I praying with a view toward what God wishes to accomplish through my life? Do I pray with expectancy, faith and hope? May God's kingdom, of which the spiritual light and food is Jesus Christ, ripple out from me today.

7. Enter the Most Holy Place through the open veil torn from top to bottom by God Himself, and kneel before the throne of the Lord Jesus at the Ark of the Covenant.

Read Hebrews 4:16 and 1 Peter 5:7.

Here the fullness of the Godhead was revealed in Jesus Christ, represented in the Mercy Seat atop the Ark. He sat down on His throne after it was finished and always beckons me to come near to His throne of grace.

A WONDERFUL Offer

Being a Christian isn't based on membership in a local church or keeping a set of rules. It involves a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and an understanding of who He is and what He has done to provide man with a way to experience God's love for us. Here's how to know Jesus Christ as your personal Savior:

1. Admit that you're a sinner, separated from a holy and perfect God.
(Romans 3:23; Isaiah 53:6)
2. Understand that the penalty for your sin is death – eternal separation from God and all that is good.
(Romans 6:23; Hebrews 9:27)
3. Believe that Jesus Christ took the penalty for your sin by dying in your place and conquered death by rising from the dead.
(Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior from sin and death and your provider of true and eternal life.
(Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9)

You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:

Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in him alone as the only way to be reconciled to you. Thank you for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen.
